In 1975, I responded to an ad in the *Pal-Item* on the subject of lapidary with the expectation of learning about rocks and minerals. After all, *lapis* is the root of the word.


Instead, I found myself invited to a cabin in the woods where sawing, grinding and polishing rocks was underway. So I paid my dues, \$10, and obtained a piece of airplane paint with red, yellow and white colors. It turned into a very colorful heart. So I was hooked.

Geodes became my choice of rocks to collect. Not blah Indiana geodes, but colorful, patterned Mexican ones. And I found an "x-ray" box that used special bulbs to add new color and patterns to rocks. It took me a few years to appreciate the crystals inside Indiana geodes and even longer to learn crystal minerals had various identities. Guess I needed the challenge of new learnings.

Club members never hesitated to answer my dumb questions or correct my chemical designations, like S1O2.

Field trips were terrific adventures -- with new free crystals with new names and new shapes. And multiples were good for trading and giving to the club for sales.

TYING MINECRAFT CRAZE INTO GEOLOGICAL KNOWLEDGE

s we begin a new year filled with the promise of exciting new finds, we also find ourselves at the start of a year with our junior members who are eager to dive into the world of geology. The junior members are the future of our programs and the future of geology. Many of our kids are already deeply involved in learning about geology without even realizing it.

The wildly-popular "World of Minecraft" is a fun and unique computer game where children learn coding and go on adventures, and yet also come into contact with many geology terms. While speaking with children about the game, it is readily apparent that these kids are hearing many geological terms (andesite, granite, obsidian, lapis) and are using these terms with little understanding of what these stones really are. Why not take this as an opportunity to advance their knowledge and interest in geology even further?

Our club recently hosted a "Minecraft Night." Different stones from the game were made available for everyone to see real life examples. 

GeoNotes



Gold and Diamonds in Indiana





During the Ice Age, vast continental glaciers brought minute quantities of gold, diamonds and other precious minerals into Indiana from Canada. These minerals were deposited from the melting ice along with incalculable tons of rock and other materials carried by the glaciers. Meltwater streams washed and sorted the glacial drift, concentrating some of the coarser, harder, and more durable materials in sand and gravel deposits along sluiceways and streambeds.

Since its first reprinting in 1963, Willis S. Blatch-

ley's original 1905 manuscript "Gold and Diamonds in Indiana" has been a best-seller of the Indiana Geological Survey. Much of the appeal of Blatchley's report derives from the novelty of the topic. Most people do not think of the Midwest as an area in which either gold or diamonds are found. Indiana gold, although not plentiful, has been found as small flakes in sufficient quantities mostly along streams in Morgan and Brown Counties to keep interest in recovering the yellow metal alive for more than 135 years.
