


How did your interest in rocks, gems or minerals develop? Lisa

What do you hope to learn? We haven't gotten far enough along to set any goals.


What areas interest you most?



■Mike Manning of Manning's Rock Shop, sells a wide variety of tumbled stones, fossils and mineral specimens at the EIGGS rock & gem show.

Mall everyone to his annual holiday open house at Manning's Rock Shop.

He will have over 100 types of tumbled stones and many types of rough rock includ-

ing sodalite, agates, jaspers and obsidians. He also has fossils including megladon shark teeth, mastodon teeth, trilobites, crinoids. The shop also has display pieces, salt lamps, cabbed stones, minerals including azurite, quartz, malachite, citrine, fluorite, 2017 calendars of fine agates and jaspers, rainbow flint, selenite wands, creedite, optical calcite, ulexite, small meteorites, amethyst, and more.

He also sells rock tumblers, grits, polish, bags of rocks to tumble and geodes.

If you haven't seen his rock tumbling operation, that alone is worth the trip. Mike can tumble up to about 800 pounds of rock at a time. He has one unit that has eight 40-pound tumblers running off one motor, one that has eighteen 12-pound tumblers off of one motor, and two units that each hold six 12-pound tumblers off of a motor.






Moraines: Evidence of Ice Age Glaciers

In the past, the term *ground moraine* was used to describe the glacial sediment *till*, a homogenous mixture of sand, silt, clay, pebbles, and cobbles, and also the low-lying, rolling (hummocky) topography that resulted from its deposition. Currently, the term *moraine* is used to describe mounds or ridges of glacial sediment, predominantly till, deposited directly by glacier ice.

The most common moraines in Indiana are *end moraines*, formed at the margins of glaciers. These moraines are used to interpret the glacial history of an area. Moraines marking the farthest extent of a glacial advance, or that of a major readvance, are referred to as *terminal moraines*. Those formed during retreat are called *recessional moraines*.

Moraines in Indiana are somewhat arc-shaped, discontinuous ridges that in some places, such as the moraine near Valparaiso, stand in bold relief, whereas in areas like central and northeastern Indiana, they are scarcely distinguishable. Several moraines define the landscape of Indiana, recording the history of the Wisconsin Episode glaciation.

With Tube Agate formation, extremely thin mineral rods grow inside the silica gel before the gel solidifies and the chalcedony forms. Sometimes these rods remain as inclusions, while other times they hollow out and fill with silica. They are visible as tube-like formations inside the resulting agate. www.gemstonesadvisor.com/types-agate/

Plume agates have intriguing patterns that may look a bit like ferns. They are the result of formations existing on the outside of the stone before the chalcedony deposits grew. Eye agates have a distinctive spotted appearance. The spots themselves may contain concentric bands of color, or they might be one solid color. Cavities in the stone drain of silica gel, and eventually fill with chalcedony micro-crystals, resulting in the 'eyes.'



Similar to the plume agate, moss agate may have formations of inclusions which resemble ferns, trees, moss or landscapes. The inclusions are usually formed out of iron or manganese oxide. These types of agates may not have any chalcedony bands because the elements involved in the inclusion formations may inhibit their growth.
